The City is faced with a monumental budget deficit (\$400 million) for the upcoming year beginning July 1st. The Recreation and Park Department may need to cut up to \$8.5 million from its already stretched budget. These proposed cuts would include the layoff of 96 positions and reduced maintenance to our already neglected parks and facilities.

## **DON'T GET TOWED!**

You may have noticed "no parking" signs on Diamond and Collingwood. For the duration of the EVRC remodel, there will be a 40 foot parking strip for the contractor along Diamond Street and 180 foot strip on Collingwood. Much of this is already a no parking red zone. Cars found in front of the needed area during operation will be towed. DPW asks that residents note and honor the "no parking" signs.

Because the project team and the contractor understand that parking is very limited in this dense neighborhood, they intend on only posting "no parking" signs and enforcing the "no parking" rule when we have work that entails entering and exiting the site. The contractor will post the "no parking" signs in these areas 72 hours in advance.

Although DPW will continue to free up space in front of the EVRC whenever possible, it is imperative that neighbors pay careful attention to the posted "no-parking" signs. The small red and white signs, mounted on a-frames along the curb, will note the times and dates that parking will not be allowed. Once they are posted, they will tow cars if necessary. Keeping this space free of parked cars will allow the contractor to complete the needed work in a timely fashion.

## **General Membership Meeting Minutes:** Thursday, March 18, 2004

1. After introductions, President Joe Foster discussed Roberts Rules of Order, which govern EVPA meetings. Immediate Past President Gustavo Serina agreed to serve as Recording Secretary.

#### 2. Committee Reports

- Safety Chair Mike Babbitt introduced Captain Greg Corrales of Mission Police Station. Captain Corrales and members discussed the impending anti-war demonstrations, the use of Dolores Park as a staging venue for protests and marches, initial Halloween planning, and pedestrian safety.
- -Finance: The President presented the fiscal year EVPA budget, which maintains the \$1,000 reserve. Eureka! expenses and Pink Triangle Park and Memorial expenses were discussed. Upon motion made and seconded, the budget was approved.
- -UTNC: Chair David Weiss was absent, but upon his recommendation, Joe Gallagher discussed his plans to open a barber shop on 19th Street between Castro and Eureka Streets, in the space formerly occupied by Cleo's Black Cat Antiques. Upon motion and made and seconded, membership approved writing a letter to the Planning Commission in support of Mr. Gallagher's request for a Conditional Use Permit.

Member Charlie Spiegel discussed status of Dolores Street lighting: the city will do nothing until a final decision is made regarding suitable

Ed &Rec-Chair Pauline Shaver discussed scheduled springtime work at Pink Triangle Park and Memorial. The return of homeless people to sleep/camp out at the PTP&M was discussed. Park Scan surveys and technology was discussed. Seward St. mini park plagues are estimated at \$500. A picnic is planned at the park in October.

Planning-Chair Adam Hagen had nothing to report. Member Judy Hoyem introduced Mark Paez of the city Planning Department and a member of the Friends of 1800 Market Street. Mr. Paez discussed a proposed survey of buildings in Eureka Valley/Castro Area. The purpose of the survey is for data collection/analysis that would be among the items considered regarding remodeling or demolition of buildings. Discussion points included concerns by some members that once obtained, the information from the survey could limit the rights of property owners to maintain/remodel their buildings.

- 3. Member Jim Morrison discussed a new publication, The Livable City Journal. He mentioned that on the fourth Thursday of the month free seminars regarding housing in San Francisco are given at the New College on Valencia Street.
- 4. Upon motion made and seconded, the meeting was adjourned.
